Call forth our prayers and acts of kindness, and strengthen us to face our mortality with confidence in the mercy of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

Let us interpret this prayer briefly:

Gracious God, *The Creator* who out of your love and mercy you breathed *creatively* into dust the breath of life, thus creating us for a purpose to serve you and our neighbors.

Call forth that is *motivate us to worship you by* our prayers and acts of kindness,

and give us the boldness we need to strengthen us to face our mortality with confidence in the *forgiving love and* mercy of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and forever. Amen

In this prayer we acknowledge God as not only the creator of the world, but especially us who are 'dust alive' and more than human pets but active workers with a purpose of worshipping God and serving the needs of our fellow beings. In 2014 the council provided us with a \$3,500.00 grant as well. Thank you to parish administrator, Jim Benson, for writing the grants and for meeting with the local council to explain the program and use of the funds to them.

### **Outreach Gift**

From the Estate of Vilma Hall we are pleased to report that \$1,000.00 was also bequeathed separately to the church for outreach to members such as radio ministry, and other methods of keeping members connected to their church. This gift has also been placed in the Memorial Accounts to be disbursed as needed by the congregational council.

# **Permanent Fund Receives Gift**

The church has received a bequest from the Estate trust of Vilma Hall in the amount of \$61,300.00. This gift, per the terms of the trust, is to be held by the Permanent Fund and the income to be used for the general purposes of the church. Vilma died in 2008 at the age of 96 and left her estate in trust for the care of her sister, Phyllis Cousins. Phyllis died in July of 2014 just three days short of her 100th birthday. Upon Phyllis' death distribution was made of the residual of the trust. Both sisters were lifelong members of this congregation and we thank them for this gift and for their stewardship which will enrich the work of the church beyond their lifetimes.

### **Sunshine** Gift

From the Estate of Vilma Hall we are pleased to report that \$1,000.00 was bequeathed separately to the Sunshine Committee without restriction for the work they do. This gift is being held in the Memorial Funds of the church and will be disbursed to the Sunshine Committee as they have need of the funds.

### Memorial Gift

On January 7 Keith Evans, son-in-law of Pr. Ken & Grace Bjorklund died after a lengthy illness. Funeral service for Keith were held here. Keith's wife, Kathryn, had made a generous memorial gift in Keith's name to be used for "kitchen needs" at FELC. Keith was a chef and the gift is fitting. Pastor's Aid & Martha Guild have been made aware of this gift which will be held in the Memorial account until requested for use in the kitchen.

We are most appreciative for this gift.


### **Funerals** Robert A. Sigren Walter Wells, Jr. Keith Evans

March 8th **Toothbrushes** (adult size, in original packaging)




March 22nd Nail clippers (metal, attached file optional)

## MALARIA SUNDAY, APRIL 26th "Gifts that grow the church and transform lives"



#### **DID YOU KNOW:**

Malaria is a preventable treatable disease spread through the bite of an infected mosquito The disease claims the life of a child every 60 seconds. Malaria was virtually eliminated from the United States in 1951, but it remains a major health concern in more than 100 countries worldwide. To most of us in the United states, mosquitos are nothing more than a nuisance. But many countries in Africa just one bite from an infected mosquito could transmit malaria and lead to death. A bed net treated with long-lasting insecticide, coupled with training and education on how it is used, helps ensure that families are protected from this life-threatening disease as they sleep.

It takes only \$250.00 to supply mosquito nets for an entire village. Please help us reach that goal and save one village at a time. Look for the mosquito net outside of the chapel throughout Lent and donate as you are able.

# **MEAL PACKAGING**

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On Saturday, January 24 amid a light snowstorm 52 volunteers gathered in the Hilston Gymnasium of the Fruth Center to package meals for the hungry. This event was sponsored by Joy in Christ Lutheran Church, Abington, First and our Food for Friends Food Pantry in collaboration with EndHungerNE, part of Outreach/Kid's Care.

Volunteers under the direction of EndHungerNE coordinator, Matthew Martin formed assembly lines that packaged beans & rice and mac & cheese meals. Funds for the food came from Joy in Christ and from Food for Friends. The beans & rice meals will be distributed through Food for Friends and the Mac & Cheese meals through the Blessings in a Backpack program in the Brockton Public Schools.

In addition to volunteers from First and Food for Friends help came from Joy in Christ, the local Girl Scout troops, Chartwell's, the Brockton Public Schools food service provider, Ward 2 School Committee member, Andy Robinson and members of the community. Brockton Superintendent of Schools, Kathy Smith stopped by with our own Maxine Richardson, Director of Community Schools and After School Programs.

There exists a great need for food just within the schools of the city and Food for Friends hopes to be able to partner with the school department and others to work to abate that need. More information will follow!

# **2015 Cornerstone Concert Series**



# 148th Annual Meeting

The 148th Annual Meeting of the Congregation was held on Sunday, January 25, the following resolutions were passed:

1. That the proposed Annual Budget of \$ \$534,144.00 for 2015 be approved; and that the members of First Evangelical Lutheran Church be exhorted to give their full support to the programs and ministries of the congregation in the coming year.

2. That the following resolution, adopted at the 147<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting be continued as specified: That up to \$10,000.00 be transferred from the Parsonage Account of the Permanent Fund when and as needed to cover expenses related to the Calling of a new pastor.

3. That the following resolution, adopted at the 145<sup>th</sup> Annual Meeting be continued as specified: That the Congregational Council and Church Treasurer be authorized to draw from the Heritage Account of the Permanent Fund up to \$88,000.00, as needed, between January of 2015 and January of 2016 to meet the mortgage obligation on the Fruth Center property.

4. That the Congregation adopt, as recommended by the Congregational Council, the new Mission Statement: "Gathered in Christ, Together We Serve"

5. That the amendments to the Constitution and By-Laws of First Evangelical Lutheran Church be adopted as presented.

6. That we give thanks to God the Father, Son and Holy Spirit, for His presence with us in Word and Sacrament within and through this community of faith.

7. That we give thanks to our dedicated staff –administrative, elected, secretarial, musical, maintenance, ministerial and volunteer - for their faithfulness in the performance of their duties. We give thanks to all persons who shared the gift of their presence, their time, their talents and their resources, in the diverse ministries of this congregation.

8. That we give thanks to all who so generously gave to support this year's Giving Tree and especially to Eric Olson for his generous gift in memory of his parents, Paul & Priscilla Olson.

9. That we give thanks to Almighty God for the young men and women from this congregation who are in the service of their country in these uncertain times. May the protective hand of God guide and watch over them as they strive to seek peace and guard our freedoms; and be it further resolved, that we gratefully remember those from among us who in past generations protected those sacred freedoms.

**10.** In the spirit of thanks to God we remember with thanksgiving the faithful witness of those who have gone before us, who have encouraged us by the witness of their faith and the generosity of their hearts. We encourage all members of the congregation to be faithful in the giving of their time, talents and resources to the ongoing ministries of the church. And that all members of the congregation be encouraged to remember the church in their wills, estate planning, memorial gifts and other stewardship opportunities.

At the Annual meeting the following were elected to Council: Diane Perry, Mark Richardson, Brad Ness, Patricia McAfee & Lynn Pearson. Elected to the Nominating Committee were Dana Christensen, Herb Woodward, Jean-Ellen Ouellette-Kenney,

Brian Pearson, Jan Anderson & Wilette Thompson. William Dunphy, Sheri Anderson and Liz Belanger were elected to the Audit Committee and Richard Pearson & Jean-Ellen Ouellette-Kenney were elected trustees of the Permanent Fund. There being no nominations for voting members to the Synod Assembly it was left to the Council to appoint such persons.

In addition, the Mar Thoma Church cooperates in ecumenical organizations and theological institutions with sister denominational churches in India and abroad.
